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Forgiveness and Mercy

To prepare for Lent and Advent in most Catholic churches there will usually be penitential service for us to confess our sins and be reconciled with God. The priest will listen, bless us and request us to pray or do the penance that he prescribes.

As we enter the Church, each Parishioner will bless himself/herself with holy water by making the sign of cross to be at peace as we come to give thanksgiving to God. It is always a challenge for us whether we live the Gospel way after listening to the Word of God every weekend.

As the mass starts, we all pray the common and collective forgiveness prayer for all our sins in our daily lives committed and ask for God's mercy and forgiveness.

Case One: I remembered that many years ago when I was young a neighbour from our village owed a substantial amount of money to the neighbourhood provision shop owner. The basic provisions for the village were supplied to the families by the provision shop owner. Each family's credit note was recorded on a "555" note book. At the end of each month the debtors repaid their debts to the provision shop owner. This used to be a routine practice every month.

One of the debtors, the breadwinner in his family, was hospitalised and could not repay his debt on time. His wife approached the shop owner for an extension period. Due to the understanding and the concern that the provision shop owner had for that family, he told her not to worry too much and to repay the debts once her husband is able to work.

The goodwill, kindness and mercy shown to such families in difficult moments enabled these families to continue with their normal life without any fear.

Case Two: A loving father of three boys had a shocking experience when one of their sons was arrested due to a fight within the school premises. He was detained for one night and was sent to the Institute of Mental Health for further assessment by the police.

The next day the Social Worker discussed the case together with his parents, even, though it was very tense for it was their first experience. Upon his discharge, the parents welcomed him back whole heartedly and lovingly much to his surprise.

Even though his parents were disappointed as expected, they still encouraged him to continue his studies. Their approach of forgiveness was to accept him in a silent manner without discouraging him from his studies.

Case Three: In one of the Neighbourhood Christian Community (NCC), it was a very difficult and challenging moment for all of us when one of our neighbour's daughters became pregnant though she was only a student. We had a long and lengthy discussion together as a neighbourhood group. At the end of the day both her parents accepted their daughter's decision to go without an abortion. It was a very bold and wise decision by their daughter. For her parents initially it was very painful but they acknowledged her decision and continued to support her in her journey.

Case Four: In our work environment I am sure we all had many encounters due to our nature of work. There is demand, expectation and time schedules to meet. With such competitive and challenging environments over the months and years it may cause differences and misunderstanding in our work places. However, the challenge is usually work related, and not the person so with all our experience it is a matter of forgiveness so as to build an environment of friendship and trust while at the same time accommodating our differences.
